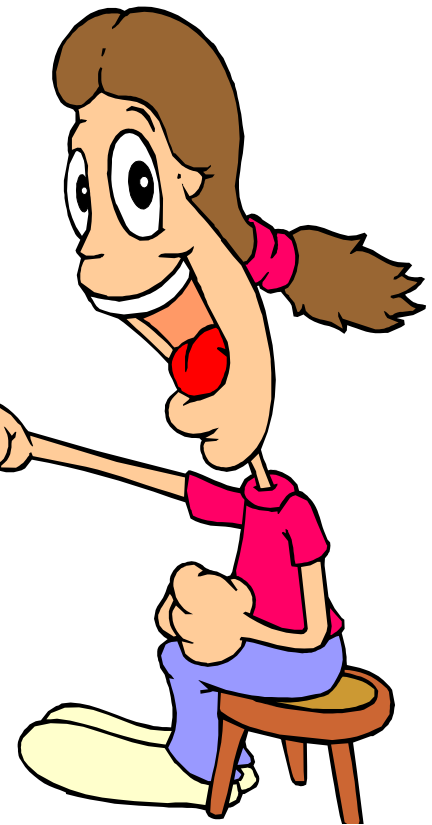
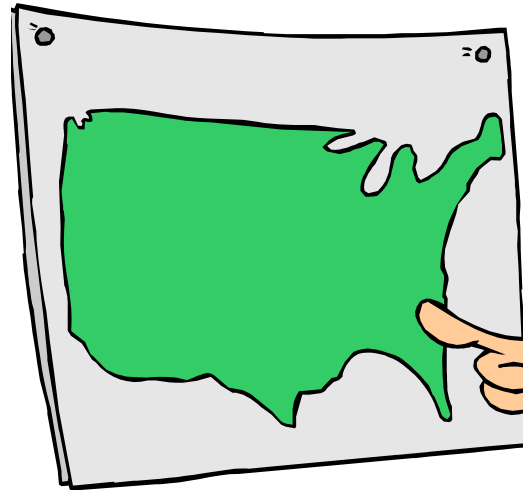
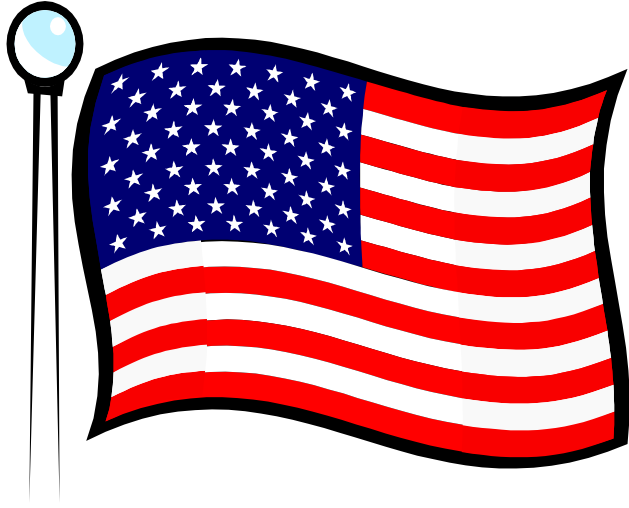
The use of Tú and Usted

- **Tú** and **Usted** mean the same thing:
YOU
- This **YOU** is **singular**, not as a group.
 - Ex: YOU Mary not YOU GUYS
- **Tú** is the informal version, meaning the way you talk to your brother, friend or someone your age. It is very familiar!
- **Usted** is used when we talk to an adult, an elderly person or someone with a higher rank. It is formal!
