

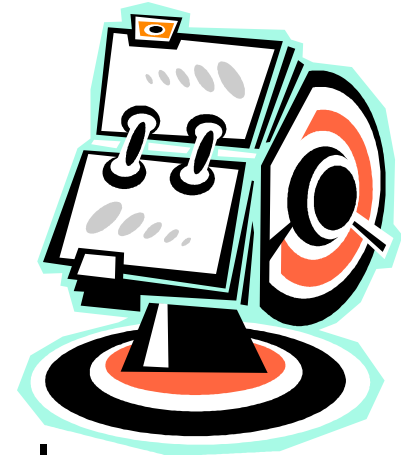

Names in Spanish

- ▶ Page 11: Read names...
- ▶ In Spanish the name is like this:
 - First Name
 - Middle Name
 - 1st Last name (Father)
 - 2nd Last name (Mother)
- ▶ Girls: When you get married, you lose your second last name and you adopt your husband's



The culture of names

- ▶ Many of the Spanish names come from the Judeo-Christian culture, therefore some names are combined. The most common one is MARÍA followed by another name. MARÍA is Spanish for MARY, the Virgin Mary.
- ▶ Many of these names are used combined and cannot be separated.
 - EX: María José (Mary Joseph)

- ▶ In many countries, your SAINT (the saint from which you got your name) is celebrated in the Spanish tradition. It is celebrated on the day of that Saint.
- ▶ Finally, last names have a history too. Many last names have a meaning in Spanish. For example, many last names that end in “EZ” mean “son of...” therefore,
 - ALVAREZ = SON OF Alvaro
 - FERNANDEZ = SON OF Fernando
